The TRIPS Agreement and the Global Politics of Intellectual Property Reform in Developing Countries

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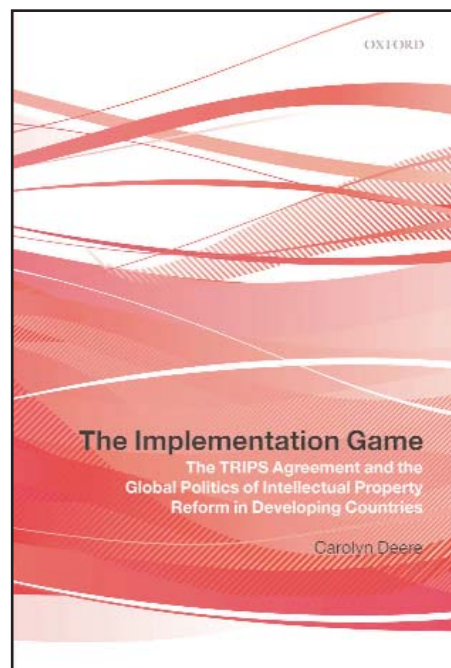
